In fact, this charge is not supported by the evidence. In his ruling reducing Woodward's conviction from second-degree murder to manslaughter, Judge Hiller B. Nobel wrote: "Defense counsel- vigorously urged, and the government with equal vigor opposed, my denying the jury an opportunity to c6nsider the verdict of manslaughter, Today, the positions are reversed. The defense seeks a reduction to manslaughter; the government decries allowing Defendant a second opportunity." Zobel thus confirms consistent news reportage that it was the defense, not the prosecution, which gambled with Woodward's fate by insisting on an all-or-nothing consideration of murder.
